Dear Friends,

As we once again enter this season of Stewardship, I would like us to reflect upon being cheerful givers with faithful and grateful hearts. For we know that "*It is more blessed to give than to receive.*" *Acts 20:35*

Given the recent pandemic, outbreak of wars, and severe weather events occurring regularly worldwide, we are daily reminded of how all that God provides for us can be gone in an instant. As followers of our Lord Jesus Christ, we are therefore implored to "*lay up for ourselves treasures in heav-en*" (*Matt. 6:19*), which the giving of one's times, talents, and treasures to His body, the church, helps to achieve.

This year's New Consecration Sunday will take place on Sunday, November 12th, with <u>one service only at 10:00 am</u>. The theme for 2023 is "Creation Caring Stewards, Expressing Gratitude by our Giving" and the scripture is Psalm 43:6 - "*Put your trust in God; for I will yet give thanks to him, who is the help of my countenance, and my God.*"

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the *need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development*, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating our members like those of a social club who should pay dues to Trinity Cathedral, we treat our members like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship.

To that end, New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on New Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our Cathedral's ministries in this community and around the world. Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on New Consecration Sunday in person or online. <u>Our New Consecration Sunday presenter will be Deacon Trisha Thorme, Executive Director of Episcopal Community Services.</u>

Ideally we would love everyone present on New Consecration Sunday but if not possible, please reflect upon Psalm 43:6 as you prepare to fill out your 2024 pledge (pledge cards available at the Cathedral). "*Put your trust in God; for I will yet give thanks to him, who is the help of my countenance, and my God.*"

Please know your Cathedral leadership will forever seek to be good and faithful stewards of those gifts entrusted to our responsibility. The Wardens, Vestry and Dean appreciate your sacrificial giving and encourage your active participation in New Consecration Sunday and our many ministries.

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Highlights of the October 16, 2023 Vestry Meeting of Trinity Cathedral

Thirteen of the 14 members of the Vestry (or Minor Chapter) of Trinity Cathedral, met via Zoom on Monday evening, October 16, at 6:30 pm. They are The Very Rev. Dean René John, Senior Warden Denise Higgins, Junior Warden J. Gilbert Williams, Treasurer Ron Zilinski, Clerk Chinweze Ahaghotu, Assistant Clerk Cn. Paul Cooper, Lourdez Hernandez, Nancy Hood-Boczar, Margaret Nartey, Bobbie Powell, Samuel Richards, Ellen Wanser, and Lee Whiteman. Robert Bullington attended as a Guest. The Dean called the meeting to order at 6:33 pm and offered the opening prayer. The main agenda items were addressed as follows:

- <u>Audio/Video Livestreaming Proposal.</u> Guest Robert Bullington, principal of Front Row Seat Productions LLC, presented a proposal for procurement and installation of a three-camera video system – including a motorized pan/tilt/zoom (PTZ) camera with 40x zoom capability mounted at center-rear of main aisle, fixed-angle camera with 20x zoom capability mounted at center-rear of main aisle, and PTZ camera with 20x zoom capability mounted on forward chancel wall – that incorporates a customized audio feed from the sanctuary audio system that has portable, intuitive controls to allow non-technical users to change camera views and operate the livestream. This system has the flexibility to transition to views of the congregation, choir, readers, homilists, altar, etc. and is used by other churches in the diocese as well as in the NJ State Legislature chamber. The proposal includes a dedicated computer, tablet, and applicable software; and Robert would be assisted by Peter Cornell for the installation, documentation, and training. Robert answered many questions from the Vestry, mainly from Lee Whiteman, the main operator of our current livestream system. All being satisfied with the proposal, the Vestry voted unanimously to accept it and to authorize the expenditure of the proposed price of \$14,141.99. The Dean will follow up with the Vestry regarding questions on warranties and service agreements for the proposal, and how long the installation would take.
- *Financial Summary.* Treasurer Ron Zilinski presented a financial summary of the Cathedral's operations: our budgeted operating income and expenses for the year each totaling \$793k. To date, the income from pledges and trusts is still greater than expected; and all except the latest monthly payment of Diocesan support has been received. Expenses are about as planned except for \$18k more property costs than planned, which Ron will try to get covered by bequeathed funds. Yet, the resulting actual deficit of \$107k in our operations as of the end of September is only \$13k more than the \$94k deficit originally expected at this time of the year. In addition, the balance of restricted gifts to the Cathedral total \$135k at the end of September. The Finance Committee will discuss the restricted gifts and make a recommendation to the Vestry.
- <u>Investments.</u> Paul Cooper presented a summary of the Cathedral's investments, which currently amount to \$2.27 million, 35% of which is in four funds of the *Diocesan Investment Trust* (DIT); 24% is mostly a recent bequest residing in a brokerage account; and the remaining 41% is in the *Dean Adams Trust* (DAT), which is managed by three trustees according to the will of Dean Adams. The *Endowment Board* manages those three of the four DIT funds that are endowment funds as well as those portions of bequests to the Cathedral that may be designated by the donors or by the Vestry as endowments. This year's total yield of the DIT funds as of the end of September is 5.9% down from 10.1% at the end of August due to a drop in the stock market. Short term instruments in the brokerage account are earning 5%; from which \$50k was withdrawn to provide needed cash in July. The Dean Adams Trust is down due to the market drop and its annual distribution of 6.5% to the Cathedral operating fund.
- <u>Property & Maintenance (P&M).</u> Gil Williams presented a request from Irene Sanz of the Gardening and Grounds Committee for coverage of *General Tree Work*, specifically *general safety hazard pruning* around the cathedral property, including the food pantry walk, walkways, parking areas, bus stop, tree at the front corner of the cathedral building, trees in the playground and between parking and street – as well as removal of the resulting brush and debris. The total bill for this work is \$2,500. The Dean believes it to be a practical expense that can be covered by a portion of the \$50k taken from the bequest monies in the brokerage account. The Vestry then approved this action.

- *Food Pantry*. Lourdez Hernandez reported that the food pantry served 220 adults and 108 children in July, and 213 families (321 adults and 124 children) in August, and 210 families (298 adults and 125 children) in September. Volunteers, using donated reusable bags, bag the food at 5 pm on the Thursdays preceding the 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} Saturdays of the month when it is distributed. They will distribute 100 Thanksgiving turkeys on Wednesday, November 15, from 10 am to 1 pm; as well as 10 large hams. Lourdez expects that 125 turkeys are needed to provide for all families, so the Food Pantry is **requesting donations of at least 25 medium (6 8lb) turkeys from the congregation.**
- *Fund Raising.* Dennie reported that the golf outing and other activities of *Community Day* on October 8 were successful, and Ron estimated the gross receipts at \$40k with expenses of \$10k, the net amount for the Cathedral being about \$30k. *Pickle Ball* took place for the first time, was enjoyable, and should attract more players next year. Dennie added that an *Alice-in-Wonderland Tea Party* is planned for next year. Bobbie Powell reported that the *CAST* concert on October 1 by Richard Alston was enjoyable but only broke even due to limited attendance. She said no further *CAST* concerts are planned for the remainder of this year. Samuel Richards confirmed that the *African Festival* will not take place this year, and the African Festival Committee is discussing resuming the festival next year.
- <u>Social Justice/Episcopal Community Services (ECS).</u> Dennie reported that the Cathedral will host a *Conference on Women's Health* in Synod Hall on November 4. This includes maternal health checks and relevant materials. Dennie added that she attended an ECS meeting at which Ray Lesniak spoke about the need for treatment in cases of incarceration. She said the Bishop made the point that we have the space for such activities. The Dean said more can be learned in this regard by reading *Good News in the Garden State* published by the Diocese.

Dean's Report. The Dean shared the following:

Garden Tour. He appreciates the participation by the Vestry in the Cathedral Landscaping and Grounds Tour on Sunday October 8 after Mass. As to the next phase of the gardening program, he said we need to make sure that all the costs are covered ahead of time.

Emergency Action Plan. He is grateful for the work of the *Emergency Action Committee*, which deals with safety in medical, fire, weather, and unwanted intruder emergencies. Bobbie said the Committee, including herself, Margaret Nartey, Fay Manicke, and Mary Johnson, met and produced a preliminary *Emergency Action Plan* document which was sent to Dan Anderson for review. The Committee will meet again to review Dan's feedback and revise the final document, which will be shared with the Vestry and then with the congregation.

Appreciation Month. On Sundays in October, appreciation was expressed for the Choir, Clergy, Cathedral volunteers, including Fellowship Hour volunteers who served lunch on each of these Sundays.

Staff Update. Sexton P. J. Pettyjohn expects to retire at the end of this year. This will require planning on how to replace him.

Creation Care Commission. Deacon Chris Cox's *Creation Care Ministry* has identified actions for sustainable care in several areas that warrant attention and appropriate action by all. They will make a recommendation to the Vestry in the coming months.

Fellowship Hour. Refreshment will be minimal over the upcoming colder months to minimize risks of COVID-19 transmission.

Healthy Eating Recipe Cookbook. Lucy Adams and Clara Gregory are leading efforts to create a cookbook for the congregation.

Treasurer Assistance. Cynthia Coleman is helping Ron with the affidavits needed to recover the remaining monies from stolen checks earlier in the year, as well as other general financial support.

<u>Old/New Business.</u> The Dean asked that prayers be offered for Deacon Carol, who has health issues.

<u>Next Meeting.</u> The next meeting will be that of the Major Chapter on Tuesday, November 14, 2023, at 6:30 pm via Zoom.

Adjournment and Closing Prayer. The meeting adjourned at 8:15 pm, with Gil Williams offering the closing prayer.
