






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Celebrating Black History






Creation Care Corner

The dedicated work of so many people all over the world is under threat and may be severely set back. Though discouraged, we are more convinced than ever of the importance of our mission to take loving care of our planet.

Maybe you are experiencing some discouragement too. So we want to share with you this soothing and energizing prayer with which we begin our Creation Care meetings. We all need soothing at times like this, but we also need the grace and motivation to redouble our efforts. Please join us in this prayer and let us know if you would like to take a more active role in caring for God's wonderful creation.



Highlights of the February 2025 Major Chapter Meeting of Trinity Cathedral

Nineteen of the 26 members of the Major Chapter of Trinity Cathedral met via Zoom on Tuesday evening, February 18, at 6:30 pm. The Bishop called the meeting to order at 6:43 pm and offered the opening prayer. The main agenda items were addressed as follows:

- <u>Introduction of New Members</u>. The newly elected and appointed members of the Major Chapter were introduced; namely, Althia Muse, elected at the January 2025 Cathedral Annual meeting; Cn. Wendy Blackman, The Rev. Kyle Cuperwich, and The Rev. Dcn. Keith McCoy, elected at the November 2024 Diocesan Convention; and Bishop appointees David A. Miller, and Joseph Walker.
- <u>Election of Clerk and Treasurer</u>. Chinweze Ahaghotu and Ron Zilinski were re-elected for one year as Clerk and Treasurer, respectively.
- *Financial Summary*. Treasurer Ron Zilinski presented a financial summary of the Cathedral's 2024 operations. Income, at \$784k, was 97% of the budgeted amount; and expenses were \$792k, 98% of the budgeted amount. The resulting \$7.7K deficit was balanced with a drawdown from the endowment. Ron then presented the 2025 balanced budget of \$842k. The Major Chapter accepted the 2024 results and approved the 2025 Budget.
- <u>Investments.</u> Cn. Paul Cooper presented a summary of the Cathedral's investments, which, at the end of 2024 totaled \$2.55M or 9.8% more than at the end of 2023. \$1.09M of the total is under the management of the Cathedral's Endowment Board, and \$1.04M is under the management of the trustees of the *Dean Adams Trust* (DAT). The Vestry manages the remaining \$0.42M.
- <u>State of the Academy.</u> Cn. Noreen Duncan sent in a report on the Academy. Under the leadership of The Venerable Lynn Johnson, the Academy has prepared a Safe Space policy for the faculty, staff and parents, which is aligned with guidelines issued by the Early Childhood Office of the Trenton Board of Education. 39 children are currently enrolled, and the Academy has provisions to meet the language needs of the Spanish and Creole speaking preschoolers. All operating licenses and certifications are up to date; and the Academy continues to be fully funded and is current regarding all financial obligations including rent to the Cathedral.
- <u>Property & Maintenance (P&M).</u> Senior Warden Gil Willaims reported for P&M Chair Mike Raab and shared that the recently formed *Capital Committee* is working on a plan to address long-term P&M investments.
- <u>Fund Raising.</u> On behalf of the Cathedral Arts Series at Trinity (CAST), Bobbie Powell shared that the Cathedral hosted Keith Spencer performing the music of Paul Robeson on February 2 and is planning a Jazz Up Saturday with Maci Miller and her quartet on April 5.
- <u>Dean's Report.</u> The Dean sent in his report as follows: a) 2025 is off to a good start with a wonderful 1st Sunday service featuring music by Trinity Strings; b) our Cathedral Annual Meeting was held on January 26 with 80 congregants in attendance and electing new Vestry members, as well as Diocesan Convention and Trenton Convocation Delegates; c) on February 8 we hosted the revival of the Diocesan Acolyte Festival, our first since COVID-19; d) the 47th Absalom Jones Service of Witness was held on February 16; e) the Cathedral may obtain a grant to assist with window replacements including those in the Academy; f) he will take a Sabbatical from May 1 through August 31, and has made arrangements for Sunday coverage and pastoral care in his absence.
- <u>Bishop's Report.</u> Bishop French reported that the Diocese continues to improve financial affairs and has made significant progress to bring overdue mortgages up to date, as well as address outstanding Diocesan contributions.
- <u>Old and New Business.</u> Based on guidance from Paul Ambos, Chancellor of the Diocese, the Major Chapter cannot extend the terms (from three- to four-years) of those Convention-elected Chapter members as affirmed at the September 2024 meeting. Consequently, the Chapter rescinded the September 2024 decision and approved the requisite amendment of the Cathedral Constitution so that the transition to four-year terms for Convention-elected Chapter members can be implemented at the November 2025 Diocesan Convention.
- Next Meeting. The next Major Chapter meeting will be on Tuesday, May 13, 2025, at 6:30 pm via Zoom.
- <u>Closing Prayer and Blessing.</u> The Rev. Cuperwich offered the closing prayer, and the Bishop gave her blessing. The meeting adjourned at 7:35 pm.

Transforming Political Anger, Anxiety, Agitation and Fatigue into...

Loving Action for Peace and Justice

- Come Holy Spirit. Cultivate Stillness and Invite the Holy Spirit to help you conform your dreams for our country to God's dreams. Notice when the political rantings and ravings are making you anxious or angry in a way which paralyzes you instead of energizing you. Make space for the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.
- If your entire agenda has become waiting for any snippet of news that casts your political "opponent" in a bad light, then you need to consider changing your channels (both internal and external) to something peaceful and constructive. You may want to switch off your devices completely at least for a while. This may be a good time for a "media cleanse". Cultivate media habits that bring you the kind of peace that invites the Holy Spirit in! So that your discernment and action are positive, loving and energizing.
- ◆ Don't underestimate what <u>you</u> can do in your context to further the dream of love and fairness instead of hate. You can be "lovingly active" without being an "activist". We aren't all called to be activists but we are all called to be <u>lovingly active!</u>
- Be excited by the fact that we can <u>all</u> do <u>something</u>. A donation to strengthen the efforts of an organization that actively promotes God's dream. A phone call to your representative in government. Joining a protest march.
- Find and use the resources that <u>already</u> exist to help you with your discernment of God's justice-dream, and to help you lovingly to act in furtherance of that dream. Here are some resources and opportunities for service and advocacy, and guidance for protecting God's justice dream from abuse and misrepresentation:

Now is the time to read the book of AMOS and also 1 SAMUEL 8:11-17.

Heed their prophetic warnings, most applicable today, about how systems of power and oppression are always a threat to God's Dream of Justice and Peace for all people. Amos and Samuel will help you notice how often self-serving authority falsely claims God's endorsement. They'll help you notice false patriotism and claims of being specially chosen (see Amos 9:7). They'll help you notice when God's dream of justice and peace is being abused and distorted.

Watch out for self-serving authority especially if it claims God's endorsement:

"These will be the ways of the king who will reign over you: he will take your sons and appoint them to his chariots and to be his horsemen, and to run before his chariots; and he will appoint for himself commanders of thousands and commanders of fifties, and some to plow his ground and to reap his harvest, and to make his implements of war and the equipment of his chariots. He will take your daughters to be perfumers and cooks and bakers. He will take the best of your fields and vineyards and olive orchards and give them to his courtiers. He will take one tenth of your grain and of your vineyards and give it his officers and his courtiers. He will take your male and female slaves, and the best of your cattle and donkeys, and put them to his work. He will take one-tenth of your flocks, and you shall be his slaves." (1 Samuel 8. 11-17)

Beware of false patriotism that claims God's blessing on one country but not another:

"Are you not like the Ethiopians to me, O people of Israel? Did I not bring Israel up from the land of Egypt,

And the Philistines from Caphtor,


And the Arameans from Kir?"

(Amos 9:7)

Justice is God's Dream. Persistent Unfairness and Inequality should be our nightmare:

"Hear this, you that trample on the needy,
And bring to ruin the poor of the land,
Saying, "When will the new moon be over
So that we may sell grain;
And the sabbath, so that we may offer wheat for sale?
We will make the ephah (a unit of measurement) small,
And the shekel great,
And practice deceit with false balances,
Buying the poor for silver
And the needy for a pair of sandals,
And selling the sweepings of the wheat."
(Amos 8:4-6)


Urban Promise Updates

Job Description:

Tenebrae (The Service of Darkness) at Trinity Cathedral

Wednesday, April 16 at 7:30 pm



Sometimes, the judicious use of low-tech dramatic elements – turning off lights, a chant, or a slammed door – make a religious service resonate deeply in those in attendance. Such is the case of Tenebrae, an ancient service that captures the despair of the death of Christ in a direct, moving manner.

Also known as the Service of Darkness, the name Tenebrae means darkness or shadows, and has for centuries referred to the early morning offices of Matins and Lauds of the last three days of Holy Week. Carefully woven together, the readings and psalms recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of the events of the seizure and crucifixion of Christ as foreshadowed in the Old Testament and described in the New Testament. The story, however, is left unfinished and unresolved until Easter.

The service is noted by a gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights in the church until only a single candle, considered a symbol of Christ, remains. Toward the end of the services, this candle is hidden leaving the congregation in total darkness, reflecting the apparent victory of the forces of evil. But just as the weight of darkness and silence engulfs the cathedral, a *strepitus* ("loud noise") breaks the stillness, symbolizing the earthquake at Christ's resurrection, the hidden candle is restored to its place, and by its light all depart in silence.

Trinity Cathedral has conducted the service for more than 20 years under the leadership of Canon Paul Cooper, who has done extensive research on the origins and variations of the service. Paul notes that "Tenebrae is one of the most dramatic services held at the Cathedral. It begins with the congregation ensconced in the Cathedral's chancel with the entire Cathedral bathed in light keeping the darkness at bay. As the service progresses, lights and candles are extinguished so that the chancel appears to be an island surrounded by darkness. The readings themselves underscore the precariousness of our existence. Eventually, more candles are extinguished until only a single candle provides dim solace to the assembled. When the last candle is removed, you really feel alone and abandoned. And then, after a period of uneasy silence, that incredible, deafening noise echoes through the Cathedral. It is definitely frightening and awesome." Paul continues, "Many people who attend Tenebrae tell us that it is one of their favorite services because it helps them mentally prepare for the rest of Holy Week and the Easter celebration."
