#### A Message from Dean John

Lent 2025 has been very productive. Thanks to a grant from Episcopal Community Services, the Creation Care team at Trinity is working together with Isles to or-

ganize two programs: "Cooking with Chef Pearl" and "Dinner and a Movie". These are wonderful opportunities to build community and foster healthy eating.

On three Sundays this Lent, during fellowship hour, Danny Thomas, Executive Director of the Peace Center has led us in presentations on "Building Bridges"/ "Talking Across a Divide". This has been a very useful program about having conversations with persons with differing opinions.

Also during this Lent we are looking at the Lenten Collects and how they impact our spiritual journey (thanks Angela DiJoseph.) On Thursdays, Canon Paul Cooper has organized for us to participate in the Stations of the Cross. (These two offerings are via Zoom.)

**Rooted in Faith, Growing in Service -**On March 1, 2025, Trinity Cathedral's leadership gathered under the theme "Rooted in Faith, Growing in Service." It was a sacred time to step away from the routine, engage in visioning and spiritual renewal, and discern the future of our ministry. We celebrated our past, prayed for wisdom, and committed to the next season of God's work in our community. Leadership demands careful planning and deep faith. As the African proverb says: "If you want to go fast, go alone; if you want to go far, go together."

After some nineteen years at Trinity Cathedral, I reflect on the many lives and experiences that have shaped our journey. Through seasons of sorrow and joy, God has guided us, and I believe we have been faithful stewards of the trust placed in us.

**Faithfulness through Challenges** - One of the most challenging times was the COVID-19 pandemic in 2021–2022. We faced difficult questions about worship, community, and care. Yet, by God's grace, we stood together,

prayed fervently, and worked tirelessly.

I recall the opportunity provided by the Mayor of Trenton to help our congregation members receive vaccinations. Andrea and I spent a Sunday afternoon calling members to gauge interest, and the response was overwhelming. Likewise, I remember the steadfast leadership of the Diocesan office, and the many others who ensured we could keep our staff paid and our doors open. Thanks to the dedication of our Wardens, Vestry, and Lay Leaders, we not only survived; we remained faithful, even fulfilling our full financial commitment to the Diocese.

Last year, 2024, was another difficult season, as we mourned the loss of many beloved members of our parish. Yet, as Andraé Crouch so powerfully reminds us: "Through it all, I've learned to trust in Jesus, I've learned to trust in God."

A Hopeful Future - As we sojourn through Lent 2025, my hope is that we continue to trust in God. One of the great challenges of post-COVID times has been rebuilding our Youth Ministry. Many of our young people experienced immense anxiety during that time. Yet, by God's grace, we now witness renewal: on Easter Day, our Bishop will confirm eight young persons in their faith.

I give thanks for their teachers, their parents, and our parish community who have nurtured them. Most of all, I thank God for these young people who will boldly stand and affirm their faith. To God be the glory.

#### Tenebrae (The Service of Darkness) at Trinity Cathedral

#### Wednesday, April 16 at 7:30 pm



Sometimes, the judicious use of low-tech dramatic elements – turning off lights, a chant, or a slammed door – make a religious service resonate deeply in those in attendance. Such is the case of Tenebrae, an ancient service that captures the despair of the death of Christ in a direct, moving manner.

Also known as the Service of Darkness, the name Tenebrae means darkness or shadows, and has for centuries referred to the early morning offices of Matins and Lauds of the last three days of Holy Week. Carefully woven together, the readings and psalms recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of the events of the seizure and crucifixion of Christ as foreshadowed in the Old Testament and described in the New Testament. The story, however, is left unfinished and unresolved until Easter.

The service is noted by a gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights in the church until only a single candle, considered a symbol of Christ, remains. Toward the end of the services, this candle is hidden leaving the congregation in total darkness, reflecting the apparent victory of the forces of evil. But just as the weight of darkness and silence engulfs the cathedral, a *strepitus* ("loud noise") breaks the stillness, symbolizing the earthquake at Christ's resurrection, the hidden candle is restored to its place, and by its light all depart in silence.

Trinity Cathedral has conducted the service for more than 20 years under the leadership of Canon Paul Cooper, who has done extensive research on the origins and variations of the service. Paul notes that "Tenebrae is one of the most dramatic services held at the Cathedral. It begins with the congregation ensconced in the Cathedral's chancel with the entire Cathedral bathed in light keeping the darkness at bay. As the service progresses, lights and candles are extinguished so that the chancel appears to be an island surrounded by darkness. The readings themselves underscore the precariousness of our existence. Eventually, more candles are extinguished until only a single candle provides dim solace to the assembled. When the last candle is removed, you really feel alone and abandoned. And then, after a period of uneasy silence, that incredible, deafening noise echoes through the Cathedral. It is definitely frightening and awesome." Paul continues, "Many people who attend Tenebrae tell us that it is one of their favorite services because it helps them mentally prepare for the rest of Holy Week and the Easter celebration."

#### Highlights of the Trinity Cathedral Vestry Meeting of March 17, 2025


A quorum of eight of the fourteen members of the Vestry met virtually on Monday, March 17<sup>th</sup>, at 6:45 pm, with the Dean presiding and offering the opening prayer. Treasurer Ron Zilinski presented a summary of the Cathedral's operations through February, 2025. Income for the month was nearly according to our balanced budget for the entire year of \$842k for both income and expense – with the contributions of \$12k per month from the Diocese arriving at the end of February and paid ahead through March. Income from pledges continues to do well; however, extra February spending occurred due to property and maintenance of \$43k versus the \$29k – due partly to heating costs and the purchase of a new computer. Greater expenses than planned also come from insurance being paid a month in advance, etc. The resulting operating deficit – always high at this time of the year – was about \$65k, which is \$17k greater than planned at this time. This will be reduced when we receive the first quarterly payment of \$12k from the Dean Adams Trust (DAT). Cn. Paul Cooper reported that the Cathedral's investments to date total \$2.6 million. 42% of this total is \$1.1 million managed by the trustees of the Dean Adams Trust. Another 42% is \$1.1 million managed by the *Endowment Board*, and the remaining 16% is managed directly by the Vestry. Senior Warden Gil Williams is looking into whether the current investments that we control are in instruments that are acceptable in the Christian view of what is socially responsible.

Gil reported on *Property & Maintenance* (P&M) as follows: a) reducing the cost of trash collection by utilizing the City of Trenton's services; b) rebuilding the entry ramp from the parking lot; c) replacing several stained-glass windows; d) repairing rain gutters; e) boiler maintenance to satisfy annual inspection by the City; e) replacing the galvanized steel pipes in the boiler room – for which there is \$7k in the budget. Quotes are being obtained for the other items (a) through (d). Also reporting on the Food Pantry for Lourdez Hernandez, Gil said that the numbers are steady at 130 to 150 families being served on the Saturdays they operate; moreover, we are meeting growing needs for this service. We are arranging with others to take any extra food that we sometimes receive. A banner in memory of Food Pantry supporter Janet Thompson (RIP) will be hung in the Narthex.

Junior Warden Margaret Nartey said that she and Patrice are considering combining, or alternating, a Cathedral dance with the previously successful *Fashion Show* fundraiser in the coming months. The Dean said that the planning committee for the  $21^{st}$  annual *Golf Outing* in October has its first meeting on the  $24^{th}$  of March and are moving forward with energy under LaTonya Johnson's leadership. Bobbie Powell reported that CAST (the Cathedral Arts Series at Trinity) has \$5k in its account as a self-sustaining activity. She added that Sherri Anderson wants to do the same event with the Trinity Strings as last year, as well as to do other concert events, the latest being a cabaret starring Maci Miller on April 5<sup>th</sup> – with tickets selling for \$30 each.

In pursuit of social justice, the Dean met with pastors in Trenton on keeping open lines of communication in the city, keeping in touch with each other on deportation targets. They are doing training on knowing one's rights; moreover, greeters should be alert.

In his report to the Vestry, the Dean wants people to take care of themselves in order to be able to help others. He added that the energy was great at the Vestry Retreat with Fr. Jeffrey Roy from St. George's, Rumson. He announced that he will be taking his sabbatical leave from May to September, and that he has arranged for our staff clergy and others to conduct the services, etc., at no cost to the Cathedral.

#### Earth Day 2025 is April 22<sup>nd</sup> The theme this year is Renewable Energy.

Here are a few thoughtful and hopeful comments from Trinity Cathedral's Creation Care team:

Every country of the world has experienced the devastating effects of an increasingly hotter climate, and the race is on to counter the historical effects of advanced economies that run on fossil fuels. Clean energy technologies, known as renewables, are rapidly being deployed. Moreover, these renewables have turned out to be the cheapest and most dependable sources of energy<sup>1</sup>.

As a result, we see amazing progress in turning away from fossil fuels, especially coal. Germany's economy now runs on 60% renewable sources<sup>2</sup>; the UK on 50% renewables<sup>3</sup>.

We even find underdeveloped countries making rapid use of renewables. Pakistan's industrial centers, having found themselves subject to frequent blackouts, are now covered with inexpensive solar panels<sup>4</sup>. Countries like those in Africa can leapfrog over the need for fossil fuel powered plants and extensive power grids by adopting local solar and wind technologies. The citizens of Puerto Rico who have been dependent on an unreliable power grid are turning to solar panels.

Where do we find ourselves in the US? In the US, the use of renewables is slightly over 20%, with Texas and California leading the way<sup>5</sup>. In 2022, Congress passed the misleadingly named bipartisan Inflation Reduction Act, primarily to invest in domestic energy production and manufacturing, thus kickstarting the national development of renewables<sup>6</sup>. By 2024, 90% to 95% of all <u>new</u> additions to the national grid were carbon free<sup>7</sup>. Additionally, 334,000 jobs were created<sup>8</sup>. While this has been costly to taxpayers, the Inflation Reduction Act has attracted \$500 billion in private investment<sup>8</sup>. Meanwhile, there has been push back from fossil fuel companies who receive between \$14 and \$20 billion dollars in tax breaks every year<sup>9</sup>.

The Chinese government has invested tremendous amounts in renewables, and at the moment leads the race in this 21st century technology<sup>10</sup>. We don't yet know if the US investments will continue after the pause in funding carried out by the current Administration. Most of the investments were made in Republican leaning states and have strong constituency support<sup>11</sup>.

We hope you found this short article helpful and informative, and will inspire you to consider ways that we, as individuals, can help with the renewable energy transition. This might include discerning how we vote, or sponsoring clean energy generation through our utility bills, or even installing solar panels.


