#### **Eulogy**

To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die."

— Thomas Campbell

Today, we gather not just to mourn the loss of a remarkable woman, but to celebrate the life of someone who gave so much of herself—steadily, humbly, and always with grace.

Melba Loreign Sandiford was born on January 23, 1933 and was the first of three (3) children born to parents, Daniel Elington Bourne and Beryl Wilhemena Bourne nee Hurley; Melba, Barbara and Cyrus who died at a young age. Dan however fathered a total of twelve (12) children, five of whom have predeceased her. She spent much of her childhood between her maternal grandmother and relatives on The Mount St. Peter and her paternal grandparents in the Shorey Village. She shared fond childhood memories of times with cousins, Shurla and Sib Sib who are like sisters to her, Ronald, and Lester.

The Hurley family had a number of talented musicians and times with Uncles Wyckliffe and Stan Stan were shared frequently and fondly with us. While she did not play an instrument she enjoyed singing. She was a

member of the village choir in the Shorey and would have participated in many "Service of Songs" which were en vogue during her youth. She was active in this church and St. Peter's Parish church. At St. Andrew she was Deputy Enrolling member of the Mothers' Union and was active generally in the life of the Church.

She received her education at the St. Andrew's Church Girl's School now A. Da Costa Edwards Primary School. It was there that I believe she caught the eye of Verne, who attended the Boys' School while his father was deputy headmaster there. They were married on September 21, 1958, and the union continued until Daddy's death on August 2, 2010. Theirunion produced eight (8) children, five (5) of whom are surviving – Orwyn, Andrea, Andrew, Joy, and Hugh. Three girls, including a twin, did not survive long after birth.

Mummy was a homemaker in every sense of the word. Daddy was a seaman and during his time at sea mummy would manage the house. She was a seamstress, and she made clothes from pyjamas to dresses for the girls to ensure that we were always properly clothed. She however did not make pants or shirts for the boys beyond the pyjamas. As many of you may know Mummy and Daddy had a shop and it was during this time that we saw her strength of character shine. She had a standard for behaviour in the shop as she understood how easy it would have been for us children to pick up bad language. I will share an example of how she maintained her standard of behaviour. There was an incident that has stayed with me. I will avoid calling names to protect the memory of the guilty. There was a speculator, a short man, who smoked a "Tom". He had a wide vocabulary of cuss words. I believe he could blister you for 15 minutes without repeating cuss words. On this day in question, he had an issue with a hail and hearty gentleman from Walkers which led to Speculator unleashing his verbal venom on the gentleman from Walkers. The words were so hot that they caused the victim to cringe from the onslaught. Mummy was in the house and on hearing the commotion she entered the shop and having quickly assessed the situation ordered both of them in the road with her characteristic hand gesture. It was amusing to see the Speculator stop his tirade immediately swallowing his words in the

process. The opposite hand gesture was reserved for us, directing inside when there was behaviour she determined not good for our consumption. None of us ever considered disobeying her direction.

Management of the home included insuring that we were well nourished spiritually and physically. We all attended Church and Sunday School here at St. Andrew's Parish Church with her. At home we were assured of tasty balanced meals. She found ways to make meals tasty. Tasteless vegetables like christophenes were cooked in the stew, marrows and finger squash were stuffed with tasty seasonings to ensure that we had no excuse for not eating them. Drinks made from guava, soursop, cherry, tamarind, and golden apples were a regularly prepared in our home. Her cooking skill was such that she would make basic ingredients like biscuits and salt fish into a gourmet dish. Indeed, I recall her father commenting, "Meldora you must put labels on the food so that I know what I am eating". Another favourite was pudding and souse. I recall patrons to the shop enjoying portions and then returning later for some black pudding water...this was the days when the pudding was made from stuffing the pig belly and slowly boiled. Care being taken to avoid overcooking and the belly bursting.

Mummy had a very high regard for family. She would ensure that members of the extended family were well. I remember well the visits to Muzz and Mill Mill and visits from Aunts, Uncles and cousins who had emigrated overseas. These always involved gifts of some kind. This love of family was vividly demonstrated when her brother Dennis, his wife and oldest child died within a short period. She became the mother in the lives of her nieces and nephews.

Mummy's caring nature was not restricted to family. She would ensure that persons like Miss Headley who spent the entire day in and around the church got a meal, Nick who would walk many miles daily would also be a recipient of her generosity. I recall seeing persons from the community coming to our home and mummy would meet the in the "front house" where they would be engaged in long conversations. I deduced later that these were what we now call counselling session. We have learnt that she provided assistance to many persons while the shop was operated. We also had visits from the Belgrave family on Sunday afternoons and festivals. Not sure who adopted whom but a close bond between the families was established. I can not forget the strong family ties that existed between the King family of Cox Road Christ Church and our family. This friendship started when mummy and Godmum were both hospitalised and ended only in death. We enjoyed spending the day at each others home enjoying the culinary delights.

In the last ten (10) years of life mummy she was afflicted by Dementia. We saw her slow and steady decline as the illness progressed. We owe a debt of gratitude to Drs. Carlisle Goddard and Gillian Griffith who cared for her during thisperiod. The various caregivers who provided care at home, Kim Marshall, who was with her from the beginning of the illness, Caroline Brathwaite, Chanice Downes, Shontel Payne, June Rock, Addy Walkes, Verona Watson and Verona Jordan. The latter three (3) having predeceased her. Thanks to all of you for the care and attention given.

Mummy lived 92 beautiful years on this earth. She was a daughter, a sister, a friend, a mother, a grandmother, great grandmother, aunt - and above all, the heart and soul of family. Her wisdom did not shout; it gently guided. Her strength did not boast; it endured. And her love - unwavering, boundless - was the quiet force that shaped our lives. She taught us that kindness was never wasted, that a home was built not just with bricks but with laughter and prayer, and that even in the darkest of nights, there was always something to be thankful for. Her hands held ours when we were young, and her words stayed with us long after we'd left her arms. Even as age gently slowed her steps and dementia slowly took her away from us, her spirit remained bright. Her life was not one of grand accolades, but of lasting impact - measured in warm meals, shared stories, quiet sacrifices, and unconditional love. She leaves behind a legacy not written in books, but etched in every person who had the blessing to know her. We will carry her voice in our hearts, her smile in our memories, and her courage in our every step forward.

Goodbye, Mummy. You were our anchor, our storyteller, our greatest blessing. Rest now, knowing your love lives on in all of us.

O God of grace and glory, we remember before you this day our sister, Melba. We thank you for giving her to us, her family and friends, to know and to love as a companion on our earthly pilgrimage. In your boundless compassion, console us who mourn. Give us faith to see in death the gate of eternal life, so that in quiet confidence we may continue our course on earth, until, by your call, we are reunited with those who have gone before; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **A men.**



#### **Cathedral Stained Glass Window Restoration**

Those of you who have been to a service in the Cathedral since late June will have noticed a major change: our beautiful and historic stained glass windows over the front doors of the Cathedral have been removed and have been replaced with plywood panels. "Why?" you might ask. Here is the whole story...

There are hundreds of stained glass windows of various ages and conditions in our buildings. A few, primarily in the Chapel, have been repaired in the past 10 - 20 years, but there has been concern over the years as to the condition of all the windows. Former and current parishioners have made donations over the years specifically to be used for the care of the windows.

Two to three years ago, the windows now removed were identified as in serious need of restoration if we want to be sure that they will remain a part of the future of the Trinity Cathedral experience. These windows were donated by the McPherson Family who owned the Stacy-Trent Hotel in Trenton at one time, and are known as the "hospitality windows" since they feature important biblical events involving hospitality in Christ's ministry: Marriage at Cana, Loaves and Fishes, the Last Supper, and On the Road to Emmaus. In addition, there are four



images reflecting typical occupations in the industry: chef, waitress, porter, and cleaner. They are a point of interest to many who visit the Cathedral for tours.

Estimates were sought from two separate reputable companies, but after securing the estimates, further action was deferred until this past spring, when we requested updates to those estimates. After thoughtful consideration we selected Femenella & Associates, a New Jersey based company, as our vendor. They have an excellent reputation and many impressive clients as proof of their expertise (Princeton University Chapel, 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue Presbyterian Church, NYC, and Calvary Episcopal Church, Summit NJ; check their website for further references). Most recently their updated estimate increased minimally from the original estimate over two-plus years ago. We are confident of this decision, and the due diligence that was done in making it.

#### More details on where we are and where we need to go:

As everyone is aware, our Cathedral maintenance costs continue to escalate. But with your help, this project will not draw on our standard maintenance reserves, nor will the needed funds be drawn from our general endowment. We will draw on an existing restricted fund designated for stained glass windows which has been funded by generous congregants, and in part by the sale of the Cathedral's two Holbein paintings that were auctioned at Sotheby's ten-plus years ago.

The total cost to remove, restore, and return this window with durable see-through protection on the outside that will open them up to the world beyond the inside of the Cathedral, is \$45,000.

Our restricted account for the repair of stained glass windows was \$23,000, \$4,500 of which has been used as a deposit for this work. We have a pledge of \$5,000 towards this work already, which leaves a total of \$17,500 to be raised to complete this window.

#### **Future work on windows:**

The overall evaluation that was done in the spring of 2025 indicates that there is a great deal more work needed to ensure that our windows are secure for the foreseeable future and as the Cathedral of the Diocese of New Jersey. We

will soon publish a list of windows that need attention and our best estimate of what it will take to restore them. Perhaps, there will be a window of interest to you whose restoration you would like to sponsor.

#### In closing:

Thank you for taking the time to read about this project, and for considering how you might be able to help to meet the on-going needs of our valuable, historical, and almost irreplaceable stained glass windows. #### What's happening in the hallway leading to the Altar Guild Shop?

Many of you have noticed that there has been some work underway in the ambulatory to the right of the sanctuary in the Cathedral. The walls in the area were repainted, then a large blue rectangle appeared. Later, narrow shelves were added. And most recently, nine embroidered cushions have been placed on the shelves. What is this project and where did the cushions come from?

At some point in the history of the Trinity Cathedral, a group of persons (probably all women) interested in embroidery were organized by Murial Bishop to create a set of nine kneeler cushions to be placed at the Cathedral's main altar rail. On each cushion were embroidered five unique images reflecting the symbol of a disciple, saint, or liturgical image. The kneelers were decommissioned several years ago as they began to fail from use. This project seeks to preserve them and place them on display as examples of exceptional work and art. Part of that effort is to provide a description of both the project and the amazing array of images included in the kneeler set. By way of indicating how much work is reflected in these nine cushions:

- Each cushion has five unique images but a substantial amount of additional work surrounding the images and on the cushions' four sides. While the unique images are very detailed and distinct, the repeated, common images are also complex but also nearly identical across cushions.
- Adding together the areas of all embroidered portions of the nine cushions yields a total more than 55 square feet of hand stitched embroidery.
- A reasonable estimate of the number of stitches required to produce this work recognizing the differences between embroidery and petit point used on each yields a conservative estimate of between 8 and 13 MILLION stitches.

More than 18 months ago, we began the preservation project to clean and recondition the cushions and determine a way to display them in a way that would highlight both the extraordinary works of art that were created by volunteers as well as celebrate a chapter in the Cathedral's history. Last summer, Kate Graves, an area artist who specializes in fabrics undertook that task of partially disassembling reach cushion, removing the worn out pads inside, thoroughly cleaning the cushions covers, gently repairing areas where the weft had separated from the warp, and then installing lightweight but rigid foam inside, before sewing the cushions shut. Since then, we have examined various options for displaying the cushions in an accessible manner. After reviewing bids for the project, we opted to build the display case ourselves. The result is the almost-completed display case. We await a piece of custom-cut plexiglass to secure the center cushion. The plexiglass piece will also have explanatory descriptions of the project and work.

One of the interesting challenges In doing this project has been trying to understand and interpret the 45 unique designs. That has proven to be a much harder task that imagined. The result of our effort is that we can confidently name and explain about two-thirds of the images. In fact, many of these images can be found in stained glass windows and other displays throughout the Cathedral complex. However, a satisfactory explanation of 15 or so images remains elusive. We can describe them (e.g. "A thin cross with a large saw and a broad sword laid across") but we have yet discerned the actual references (saints, events, liturgical elements) that they reflect. We hope that persons viewing the display might offer some helpful insights so we can continue our search.



#### The Memorable Stretto UK Tour

So the Stretto orchestra UK trip is now at an end. It was tiring but enjoyable. It was truly amazing to explore the UK for over a week. Through the sunny and rainy days, it was definitely worth its money price.

My favorite concert out of the nine was in the St. David's Cathedral in Wales. It was a beautiful place to perform, especially since it was an old church, almost 1,000 years old! The glass walls were colorful and gracious. In addition, every concert had new people listening and interacting. When I performed in St. Mary's Sixpenny Handley in England, I met two local school aged sisters whose names were Rose and Ella. They really liked our performance.

My teacher Sherri Anderson chose a lot of diverse pieces. Some were contemporary, some classical, and some jazz. Every piece of music that our orchestra played had its own temperature. Fast ones like Alis Volat Propis, 100 degrees. Slow ones like Over The Rainbow, 25-50 degrees. Extremely slow ones like Small Waltz for Strings 5-25 degrees. I really enjoyed playing a piece called Sweet and Sour Cherries by Anna Rubin. It was a stretch and a challenge, but I handled it well.

My favorite place to visit is the Mary Rose Museum because I got a perfect view of the historical Mary Rose ship that sank in 1545. The old Pembroke Castle was fun and interesting too, because I could walk around and look at old photos and monuments. I even went punting in Oxford. I fed some ducks. Sadly, a duck there harassed me by biting me because it wanted more food and I had food in my hand.

A fun observation during the UK trip is that every scenery had some of the resources, namely, sheep, rock, wheat, brick, and wood, from the board game that I play with my family in New Jersey called Catan, some even had all of them! In the end, I found every single one in the UK, unlike the USA.

My brother and mom came with me too. They played in the orchestra which was adding to the greatness of this trip. My brother even played his Carmen Fantasy solo piece four times. The audience clapped loudly after he finished playing. I am very proud of him. I also interacted with some more members in the orchestra. I learned how to solve a Rubix cube because Eli and Irina taught me how.


